

# PC3H41xNIP0F Series

Mini-flat Half Pitch Package,  
High CMR, AC Input,  
Low Input Current Photocoupler



## ■ Description

**PC3H41xNIP0F Series** contains a IRED optically coupled to a phototransistor.

It is packaged in a 4-pin Mini-flat, half pitch type.

Input-output isolation voltage(rms) is 2.5kV.

Collector-emitter Voltage is 80V, CTR is 50% to 400% at input current of  $\pm 0.5\text{mA}$ , and CMR is MIN. 10kV/ $\mu\text{s}$ .

1. 4-pin Mini-flat Half pitch package (Lead pitch : 1.27mm)
2. Double transfer mold package (Ideal for Flow Soldering)
3. AC input type
4. Low input current type ( $I_F = \pm 0.5\text{mA}$ )
5. High collector-emitter voltage ( $V_{CEO} : 80\text{V}$ )
6. High noise immunity due to high common mode rejection voltage (CMR : MIN. 10kV/ $\mu\text{s}$ )
7. Isolation voltage between input and output ( $V_{iso(rms)} : 2.5\text{kV}$ )
8. RoHS directive compliant

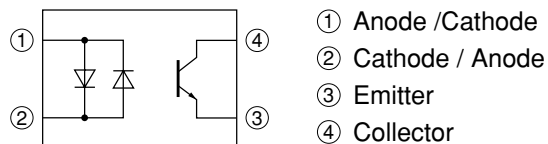

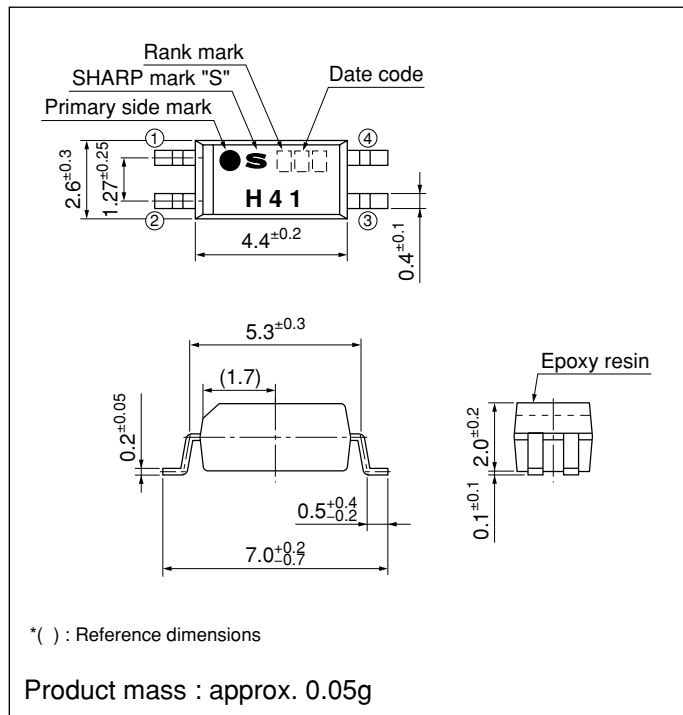
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## Internal Connection Diagram

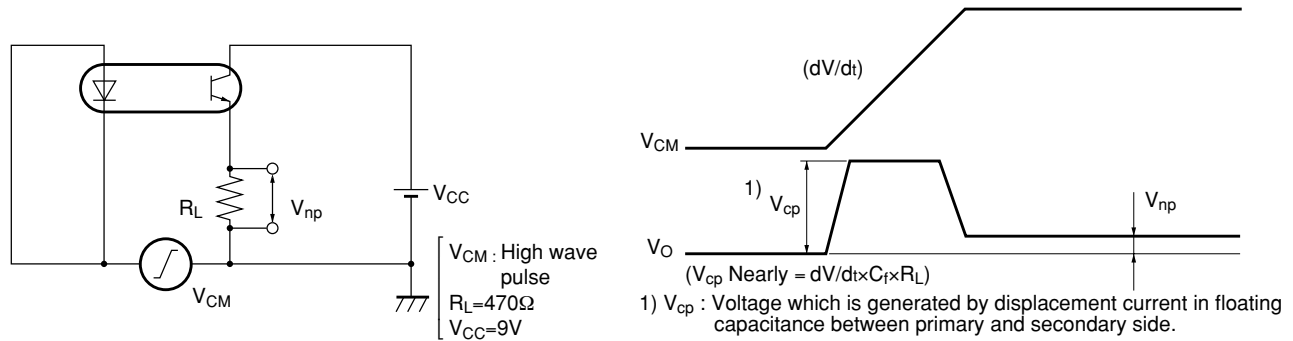

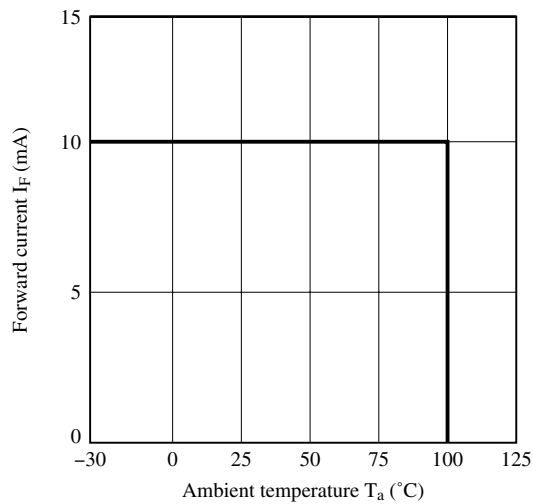

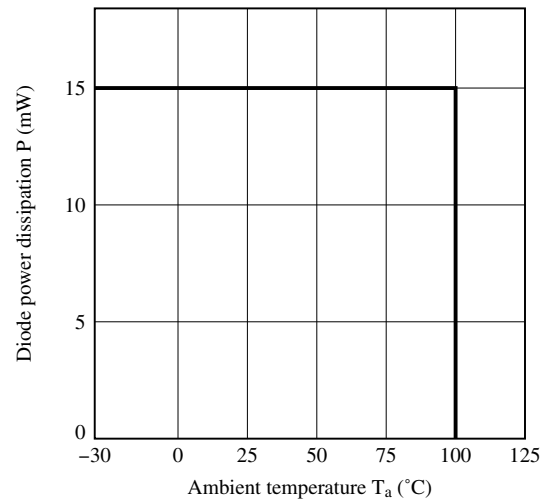
**Fig.1 Test Circuit for Common Mode Rejection Voltage**



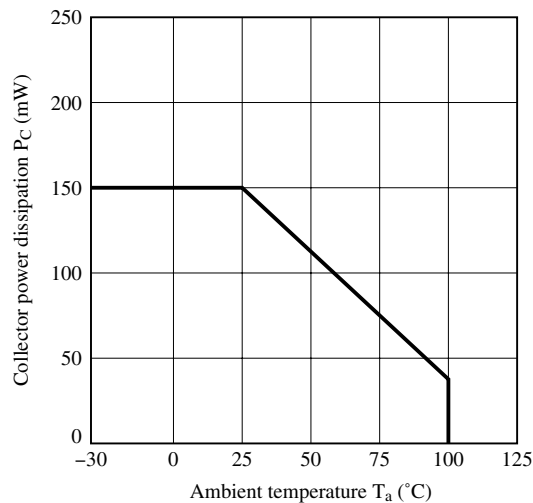
**Fig.2 Forward Current vs. Ambient Temperature**



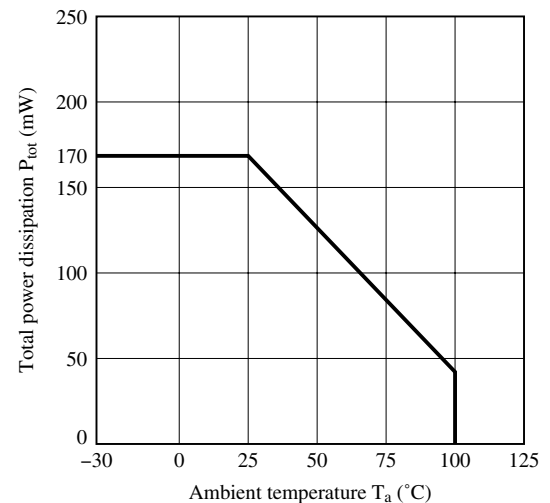
**Fig.3 Diode Power Dissipation vs. Ambient Temperature**



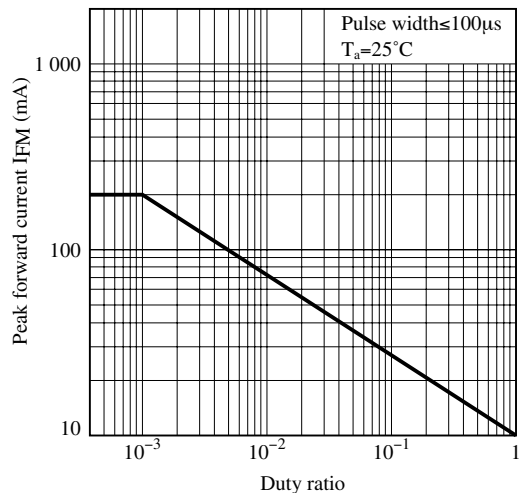
**Fig.4 Collector Power Dissipation vs. Ambient Temperature**



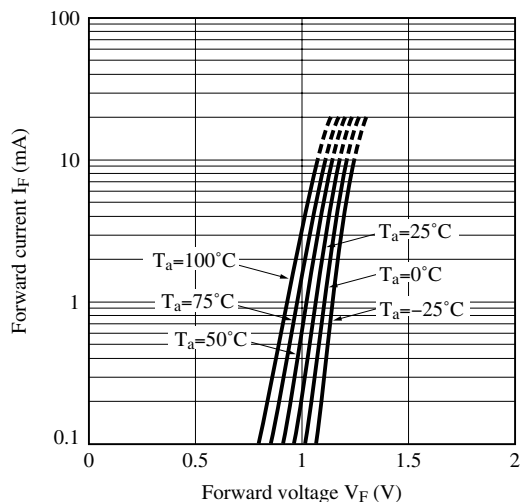
**Fig.5 Total Power Dissipation vs. Ambient Temperature**



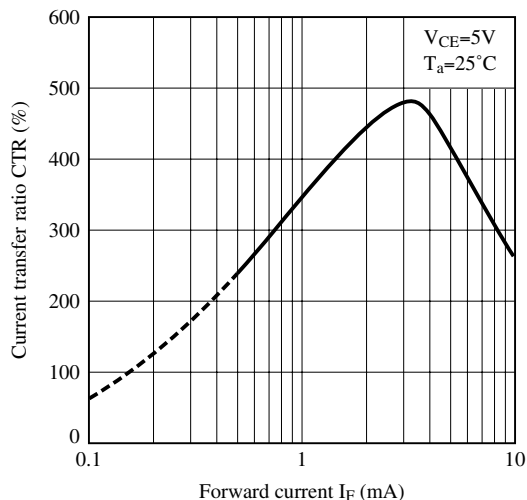
**Fig.6 Peak Forward Current vs. Duty Ratio**



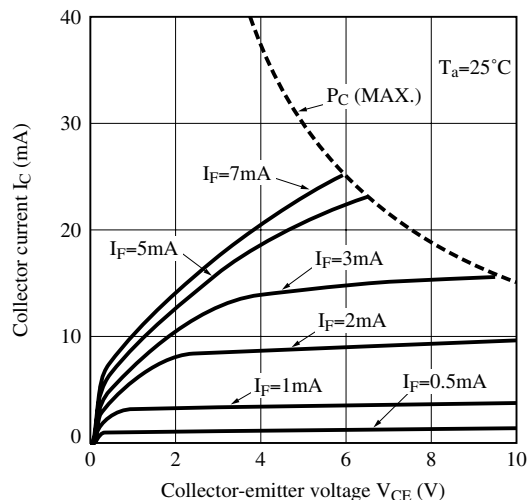
**Fig.7 Forward Current vs. Forward Voltage**



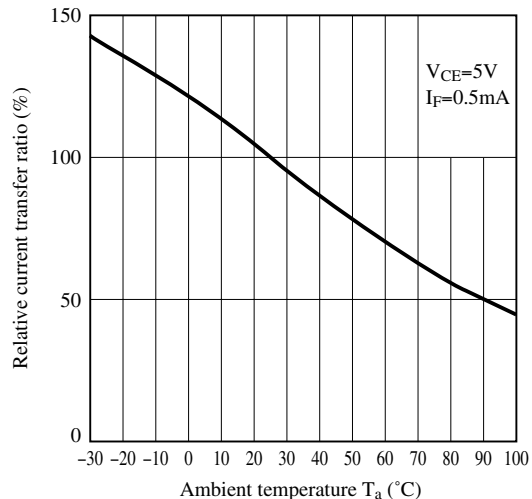
**Fig.8 Current Transfer Ratio vs. Forward Current**



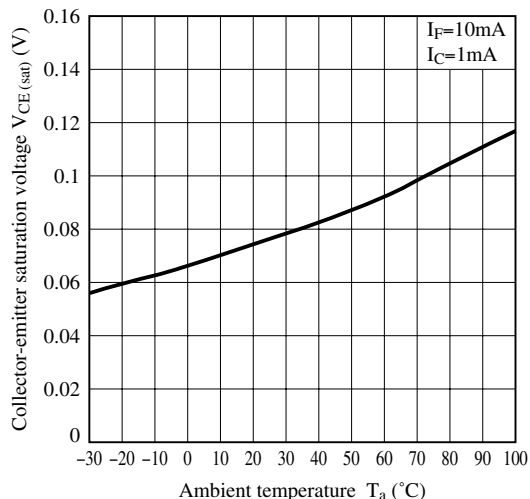
**Fig.9 Collector Current vs. Collector-emitter Voltage**



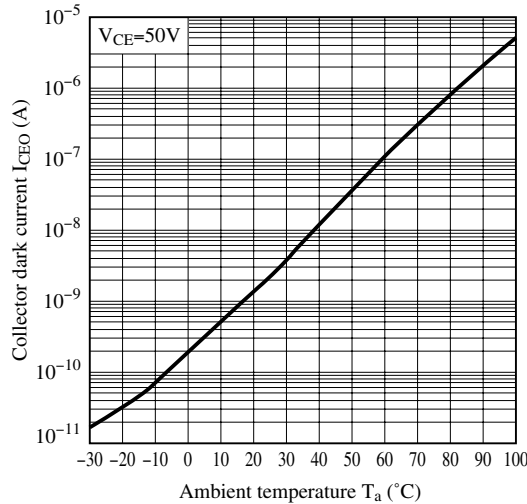
**Fig.10 Relative Current Transfer Ratio vs. Ambient Temperature**



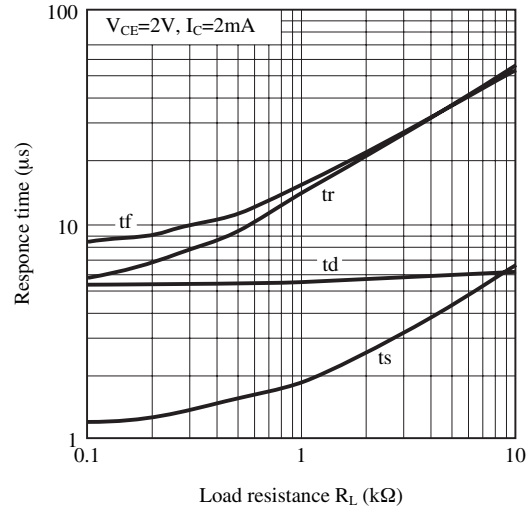
**Fig.11 Collector - emitter Saturation Voltage vs. Ambient Temperature**



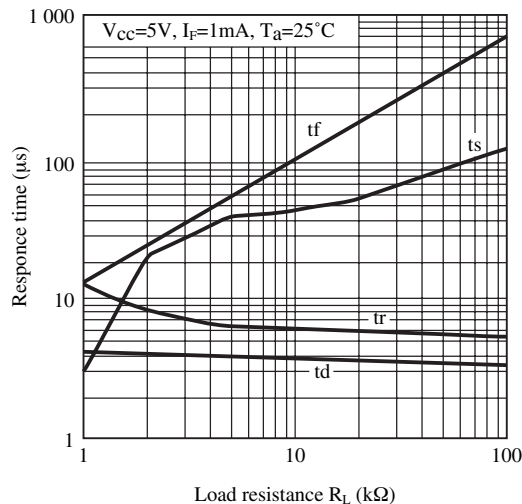
**Fig.12 Collector Dark Current vs. Ambient Temperature**



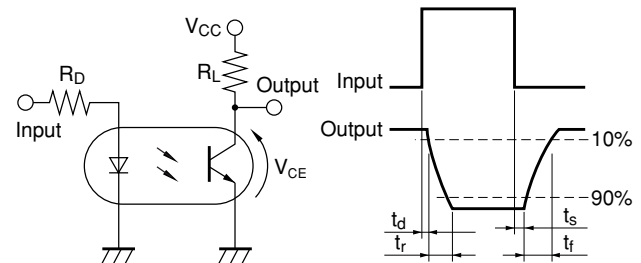
**Fig.13 Response Time vs. Load Resistance (active region)**



**Fig.14 Response Time vs. Load Resistance (saturation region)**

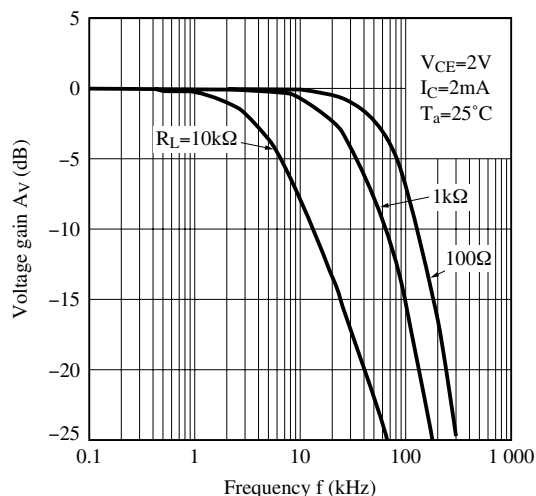


**Fig.15 Test Circuit for Response Time**

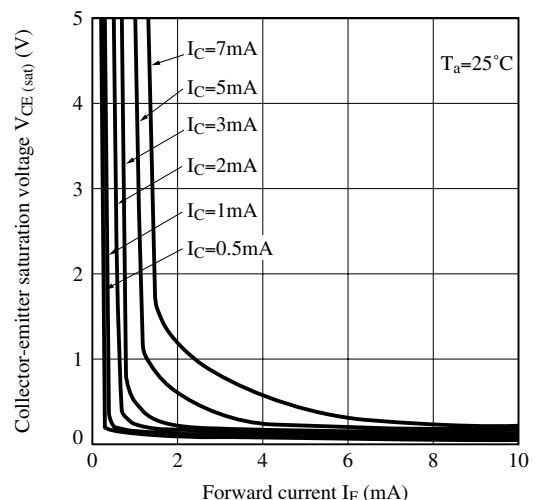

## ■ Design Considerations

### ● Design guide

While operating at  $I_F < 0.5\text{mA}$ , CTR variation may increase.  
Please make design considering this fact.

In case that some sudden big noise caused by voltage variation is provided between primary and secondary terminals of photocoupler some current caused by it is floating capacitance may be generated and result in false operation since current may go through IRED or current may change.

If the photocoupler may be used under the circumstances where noise will be generated we recommend to use the bypass capacitors at the both ends of IRED.

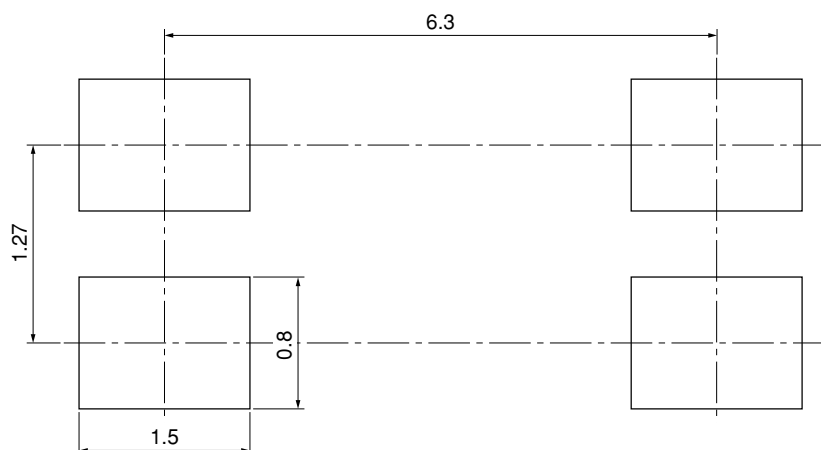
This product is not designed against irradiation and incorporates non-coherent IRED.

### ● Degradation

In general, the emission of the IRED used in photocouplers will degrade over time.

In the case of long term operation, please take the general IRED degradation (50% degradation over 5 years) into the design consideration.

## ■ Manufacturing Guidelines

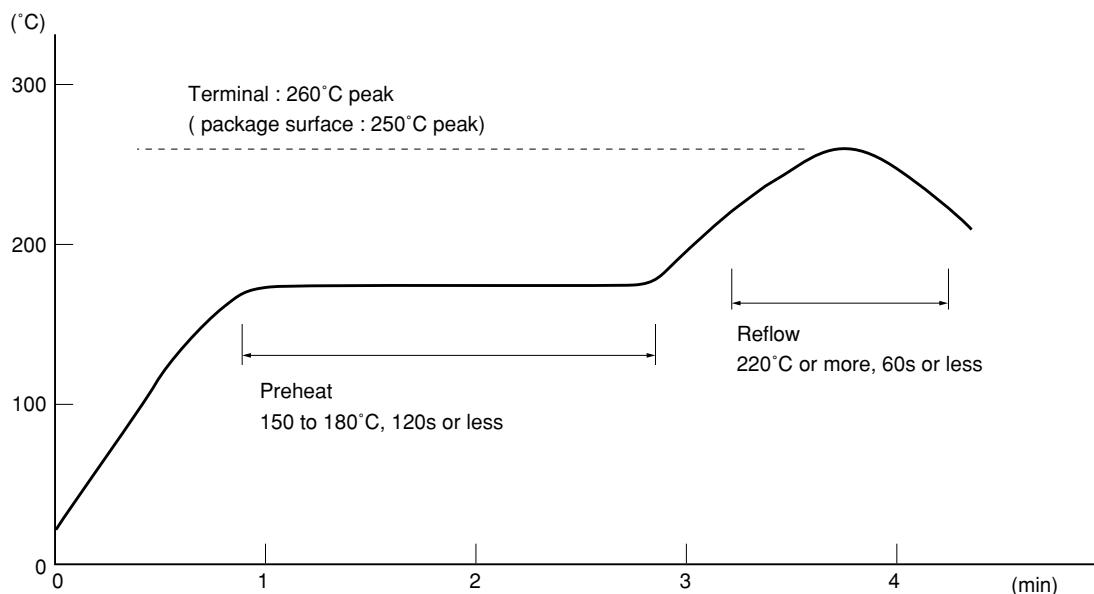
### ● Soldering Method

#### Reflow Soldering:

Reflow soldering should follow the temperature profile shown below.

Soldering should not exceed the curve of temperature profile and time.

Please don't solder more than twice.



#### Flow Soldering :

Due to SHARP's double transfer mold construction submersion in flow solder bath is allowed under the below listed guidelines.

Flow soldering should be completed below 260°C and within 10s.

Preheating is within the bounds of 100 to 150°C and 30 to 80s.

Please don't solder more than twice.

#### Hand soldering

Hand soldering should be completed within 3s when the point of solder iron is below 400°C.

Please don't solder more than twice.

#### Other notices

Please test the soldering method in actual condition and make sure the soldering works fine, since the impact on the junction between the device and PCB varies depending on the tooling and soldering conditions.

**● Cleaning instructions****Solvent cleaning:**

Solvent temperature should be 45°C or below Immersion time should be 3 minutes or less

**Ultrasonic cleaning:**

The impact on the device varies depending on the size of the cleaning bath, ultrasonic output, cleaning time, size of PCB and mounting method of the device.

Therefore, please make sure the device withstands the ultrasonic cleaning in actual conditions in advance of mass production.

**Recommended solvent materials:**

Ethyl alcohol, Methyl alcohol and Isopropyl alcohol

In case the other type of solvent materials are intended to be used, please make sure they work fine in actual using conditions since some materials may erode the packaging resin.

**● Presence of ODC**

This product shall not contain the following materials.

And they are not used in the production process for this product.

Regulation substances : CFCs, Halon, Carbon tetrachloride, 1.1.1-Trichloroethane (Methylchloroform)

Specific brominated flame retardants such as the PBBOs and PBBs are not used in this product at all.

This product shall not contain the following materials banned in the RoHS Directive (2002/95/EC).

- Lead, Mercury, Cadmium, Hexavalent chromium, Polybrominated biphenyls (PBB), Polybrominated diphenyl ethers (PBDE).
